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



Footloose in Ranthambore

Journey into the heart of India.

Rajasthan is one of the most explored states of India and unearthing something new is next to impossible for even a seasoned traveller. Having trudged and trundled for over 12 years as a solo traveller, Supriya was determined to dig up some new on her trip to the state this year. She scanned the busy streets of Jaipur, squinted at paintings and artifacts with a discerning eye in Jodhpur and decided to hop on a bike with a guide to relatively unknown places around Udaipur. **But it was Ranthambore that left her speechless. The jaw dropping beautiful scapes that unfolded are sure to stay in her memory forever.** It's not only the jungles, Ranthambore throws up surprises like the ones below.

Ranthambore Fort

An impregnable fort rises from the rocky outcrop above the forest at Ranthambore. The old walls of the fort stand testimony to the time of the Maharajas in this area. Now, the sprawling jungle below is the focus of the traveller. As you get closer, the structure looks even more inaccessible; rightly so, as it was built for protection. **Now weathered and crumbling, the fort still resonates only with former glory. The enormous gateways exude a sense of pride with a formidable vibe and are the most striking feature of the fort.** Visit here with the locals, who tend to take a 4WD upto the fort to visit a Ganesha Temple. The ancient Ganesha Temple is regarded one of the most religious spots of the area. The locals often flock here. If you are visiting the fort, do not miss the Ganesha temple inside. The local fervour is palpable here.

Ranthambore National Park

The most significant highlight and the very reason for someone to visit the town, is the verdant Ranthambore National Park. **Hemmed by rocky ridges of the**

Aravali mountain range, the park contains 1334 sq km of dense forest and a number of wildlife species. Specifically known for its population of tigers, the National Park is one of the most known wildlife destinations that travellers find themselves steering to. The easy access to Ranthambore from New Delhi makes it an ideal location to add on a Rajasthan itinerary. Stay close to the park and do ample safaris to catch a glimpse of its wild occupants. These jeep safaris veer you off the main road and into the dense shaded tree lined trails. The erstwhile hunting park of the Maharajas', this is one of the best-preserved

sanctuaries of India.

Dastkar Craft Centre

Dastkar, a non-profit organization, is rooted in the traditional culture of the villages and facilitates them to sell their excellent craft in all parts of the world. **The Dastkar Centre is something that travellers should explore for another dimension to their trip to Ranthambore. For many, it becomes only about the forest and nothing other than that.** The Dastkar Craft Centre infuses colour in your trip and

insight to your knowledge of the state. Here, you can meet the craftsmen and see magical creations upclose. You can also use this as a shopping pit stop to buy bags, saris, wall hangings, rugs clothes, stoles and more.

Rajiv Gandhi Regional Museum of Natural History

The museum was inaugurated in 2014 to open a world of historic wonders to the travellers coming to the base town of Sawai Madhopur, from where the sanctuary can be accessed. It is located in Ramsinghpura, which is a village at a distance of 9 kms from Sawai Madhopur. **The museum is a window into the world of natural history of Rajasthan and specifically the area where the national park stands. Connected: Kuala Lumpur and New Delhi

AirAsia X has been making an impact in the Indian skies, especially with the new announcement of four weekly flights on the KL-Delhi route, which is one of the most



coveted directions for travellers. The company will relaunch flights to Delhi in the beginning of the year (February 2016), four years after it suspended its service on this route. The airline had earlier withdrawn from India in 2012, putting an end to its Delhi and

Mumbai routes due to high operating costs. The carrier now sees a vast opportunity in the topography again. **The Malaysian company has confirmed that it will start operating four weekly direct flights between Kuala Lumpur and Delhi on February 3, 2016.** Flights will depart KLIA every Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday at 1900 hours, arriving in Delhi at 2200 hours, a short time for the travellers to connect between the two countries. The flight out of Delhi will leave at 2315 hours, arriving back in KL at 0730 hours the next morning. The flight time is approximately five and a half hours. Like all other AirAsia X flights, this service will also be operated using a 377-seat Airbus A330-300 aircraft, offering flat-bed seats for the comfort of the business class travellers. Like many other economy flights in India, AirAsia marches along to cash on the growing consumer base of a young nation like India. The new flights also give an opportunity for travellers to span South East Asia more efficiently and quickly.

Visit a destination during a local festival, and virtually everyone in the city or town will be in a celebratory mood. The same goes for India, a country, where it is hard to keep pace with the number of festivals. **We, at Indo Asia Tours, strive hard to bring you closest to the local culture during your travels and offer a peek into the most authentic aspects of life in the subcontinent.** One way of doing this is by showcasing some of the lesser-known festivals that will take you into their fold and cocoon you in the energy and celebrations.

This month, I want to bring your attention to a festival of colours, one that you might already be aware of. Holi has been eulogized in many photographs across the world. World famous lens men have covered different dimensions of this Indian festival, but few would be familiar with the unique tribal one celebrated in Jhabua, Madhya Pradesh. **The Holi,**

as celebrated in this small town in the Deccan is tinged in a different colour. Holi in Jhabua comes with a tribal twist. Known as 'Bhagoriya Holi', the tribals of Jhabua participate in a 'Swayamvara' or a mass marriage ceremony, in which the youngsters choose their life partners. This is an age-old tradition in which the merriment knows no bounds – expect singing, dancing, eating, drinking and attending a wedding. The same Holi is also celebrated in Varanasi, where cannabis infused drink called bhaang is a chief ingredient of a fun day.

Another venue which demands attention from culture lovers is the Holi celebrated in a royal style at the Udaipur Palace. Patronized by royalty, the celebration takes place over two days – the first day is 'Holika Dahan', (the killing of Holika, an evil character in the legend that surrounds Holi). A sombre ceremony around a large bonfire is held on this day. The second day marks complete suffusion in colours. This is a harvest festival that marks the beginning of spring, bidding adieu to the cold winter months. Another additional element to the Udaipur festivities is the 'Nobti ki Swari', a special procession with the King and his ministers. This is a one of a kind ceremony that is exclusive to the Udaipur celebrations, even though Holi is celebrated in most northern states of the country.

I hope that you discover many such festivals with us in the coming year, so we can help you add new and innovative dimensions to your trip to the Indian subcontinent.
